## Special Cultural Presentation Mystics, Nomads, and Troubadours in Central Asian Music

The rich diversity of Central Asian music and expressive culture is brought to life in this lecture-demonstration featuring renowned performers from Azerbaijan, Kazakhstan, Qaraqalpakstan (Uzbekistan), and Tajikistan. Commentary will be provided by Theodore Levin, Parents Distinguished Research Professor at Dartmouth College and curator of the ten-volume CD-DVD anthology *Music of Central Asia* coproduced by the Aga Khan Trust for Culture and Smithsonian Folkways Recordings.

From Azerbaijan, the legendary singer Alim Qasimov and his daughter, Fargana, perform selections from Azerbaijani classical and folk music, accompanied by a quartet of traditional instruments: *tar* (lute), *kemanche* (spike fiddle), *balaban* (double reed oboe), and percussion. From Kazakhstan and Qaraqalpakstan, Bardic Divas illustrate the power of the female voice in a variety of Central Asian styles. And from Tajikistan, trance-inducing mystical songs based on texts by Rumi, Hafez, and Nasir Khusrow confirm the eternal life of these classical poets' works.

This program is presented in conjunction with the opening of the exhibition *Traces of the Calligrapher* and *Writing the Word of God: Calligraphy and the Qur'an*.
